
Implementation guidance – Baby-friendly Hospital Initiative (2018)


Field Exchange - Emergency Nutrition Network

Don't Push It - Save the Children (2018)

The unique life-saving and life-enhancing benefits of breastfeeding are proven. However, the global market in breast-milk substitutes is seeing a five-fold increase in two decades that far outstrips the world's population growth. Much of this growth stems from powerful marketing campaigns that have led mothers to limit or abandon breastfeeding.
